Director's Note



GREGORY RAMOS

I see LOVE LETTERS as a statement about the dreams and aspirations of 20th century America. The characters are symbolic of different responses to the social constructs of the time. Andrew is representative of all the dreams and expectations that were placed in men at that time. That is, at least for men who had access.

Andy is fortunate. He is born in to a family with means and he is able to get a good education, get married in the conventional way, and eventually become a U.S. politician. He fulfills, at least on the surface, all that America promised. Melissa is the opposite of Andy. She represents the dreams that could not quite be fulfilled. There were social expectations placed on her as a woman that included boarding school and debutante balls. At heart Melissa is a rebel to the social constructs of her time. She is unable to reconcile being an outsider and seeks comfort in art, men, and eventually alcohol. The play is about people who have abundance and access and struggle to make good on all that fate has provided them. Although privileged and in many ways oblivious to their own fortunate circumstances, they are just people trying to find meaning and love in a period of time that saw some of the most drastic advances in technology, communications, civil rights, and women's rights. The one thing that provides them both a sense of security and acceptance over the course of fifty years is their bond and their love for one another. At heart, the play has a sweetness in its simplicity and ability to capture a time gone by. While working on the play, it has been sobering to reflect upon how our social and cultural awareness has developed since the time the play was written in 1988. It stands now as a period piece that explores an imagined American dream that omitted many and privileged those who were lucky enough to be born in a certain time and in a certain place. But we cannot fault the characters in their love for and need for each other, and we cannot ignore the beauty of their tenacity in seeking to live purposeful lives.

I want to thank the talented student actors and crew that have been a part of this special presentation. Special thanks to Joe Modica, Director of the School of Performing Arts, and Krista Newkirk, our University President, who took time out of their very busy schedules to be part of this show!
