1 Willis Center



The Willis Center is home to the Office of Admissions, Student Employment, Graduate and Professional Education, and the Student Financial Services Office. Our live bulldog mascot, Addie, can often be found snoozing on the back patio.

2 Hall of Letters



The Hall of Letters—home to our humanities departments—contains a variety of collaborative learning spaces, such as the Browsing Room and the Proudian Room. Professors' offices and classrooms are across the hall from one another, fostering strong student-faculty relationships.

3 Alumni Greek Theatre



The Alumni Greek Theatre was built in 1927 and is used for commencement, student events as Fall Fest, and concerts, which have included well-known bands such as Girl Talk, Gym Class Heroes, Black Eyed Peas, Blink 182, Fall Out Boy, and more.

4 Administration Building



The Administration Building, one of the most iconic spots on campus, was built in 1909 and overlooks the beautiful lawns and trees of the University Quad and Memorial Chapel, with the San Bernardino Mountains rising in the background. This building is home to many administrative offices, such as the Office of the President and the office of the Registrar.

5 The Johnston Complex



The Johnston Center for Integrative Studies is home to a living-learning program for students who want to design their own education. Here, they find a level of academic freedom unlike any they've experienced and a community of students and faculty interested in their ideas. About 200 talented and intellectually curious Johnston students live and learn together in a complex that includes two residence halls—Bekins and Bekins-Holt—faculty offices, a coffee house, classrooms, and community spaces.

6 Watchorn Hall



Watchorn Hall is home to California's second-oldest nationally accredited school of music. Inspired by a conservatory approach, degrees are offered include: a Bachelor of Music in performance, composition, or music education; a Bachelor of Arts with a major

in music; and a Master of Music. Students with interdisciplinary interests are welcomed. Each year, the School of Music presents more than 200 performances, and the University's studio teachers are among the finest musicians in Southern California.

7 Memorial Chapel



The Memorial Chapel is one of the most recognized buildings on campus and has a long tradition of serving as a campus gathering space. Today, the Chapel serves as the venue for the annual Feast of Lights, Redlands Symphony Orchestra performances, and guest lectures by prominent speakers, who have included writer Maya Angelou, biologist Jane Goodall, award-winning journalist James Fallows, former Vice President Al Gore, and former Secretary of State and Redlands alumnus Warren Christopher. U of R's **School of Music**—the second-oldest nationally accredited school of music in California—often uses this space to host more than 200 performances that occur throughout the school year.

8 The Armacost Library



The Armacost Library is about self-directed learning. Librarians help students make the transition from high school-level work to college-level research. The library's ground floor includes the Jones Computer Center, as well as rooms for collaboration and learning. The remaining three floors include more than 600,000 books, scores, DVDs, and other material, including

access to more than 90,000 full-text online journals. Armacost Library also houses Academic Support, Disabled Student Services, the Counseling Center, ResNet, Career and Professional Development, and the Bulldog Café.

9 Hunsaker University Center




The hub of campus life is the Hunsaker University Center. In addition to the main dining hall, Irvine Commons, it contains the Plaza Café, University Club restaurant, bookstore, student post office, and meeting spaces for student organizations. Hunsaker University Center is also home to the **Office of Campus Diversity and Inclusion**, which seeks to create spaces where students can be their whole selves. Past the maroon banners emblazoned with the U of R's Och Tamale chant is the **Armacost Library**, containing the Bulldog Café, computer lab, and a host of academic resources for students.

Residence Halls

AREAS OF INTEREST



Athletics Complex & Currier Gymnasium

U of R's 21 teams compete at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III level in the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SCIAC). Consistently ranked among the best in the league, they often compete on a national level. Athletic facilities are open to all students and include a fitness center, the **Thompson Aquatic Center**, **Ted Runner Stadium**, and many indoor and outdoor fields, tracks, and courts.



Stauffer Science Complex

Science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) fields at Redlands are interactive and interdisciplinary. The Stauffer Science Complex boasts state-of-the-art facilities—from laboratories to a deck for astronomical observation—in **Appleton**, **Hedco**, **Gregory**, and **Lewis Halls**. The complex is active throughout the school year and summer, when outstanding students are selected to participate in faculty-directed research that gives them intensive lab or field experience.



Center for the Arts

The Center for the Arts provides space for creative work. Art majors and non-majors alike utilize the Gold LEED-certified **Ann Peppers Hall** for painting, graphic design, photography, and more. The performing arts make their home in the **Glenn Wallich Theatre** and **Frederick Lowe Black Box Theatre**, where students can attend or take part in plays, musicals, and dance performances.



Truesdail Center

The Truesdail Center hosts the Communication Sciences and Disorders program and a clinic where students gain clinical experience with clients. Undergraduate and graduate students serve about 75 patients each week under faculty supervision.



Alumni House

The Office of Alumni Relations brings together professors, students, and alumni at special events at the Alumni House, and the venue is also available to the local community to rent for occasions such as weddings.
