However you see, feel or experience love in your life, we hope that today's program inspires you to see music as an essential soundtrack for life, reminding us of people, places and events, and adding a richness to the emotions that we carry with us throughout our day. Please enjoy this journey as we invite you to tap into love, in all its bittersweet glory and pain, through the lens of poetry and song.
