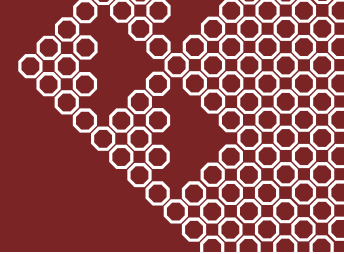


MULTIPLE SUBJECTS

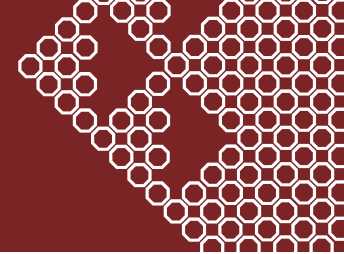

STUDENT TEACHING

- [Group Advising sessions](#) are held each semester with presentations on program updates and requirements. Attendance is highly encouraged.

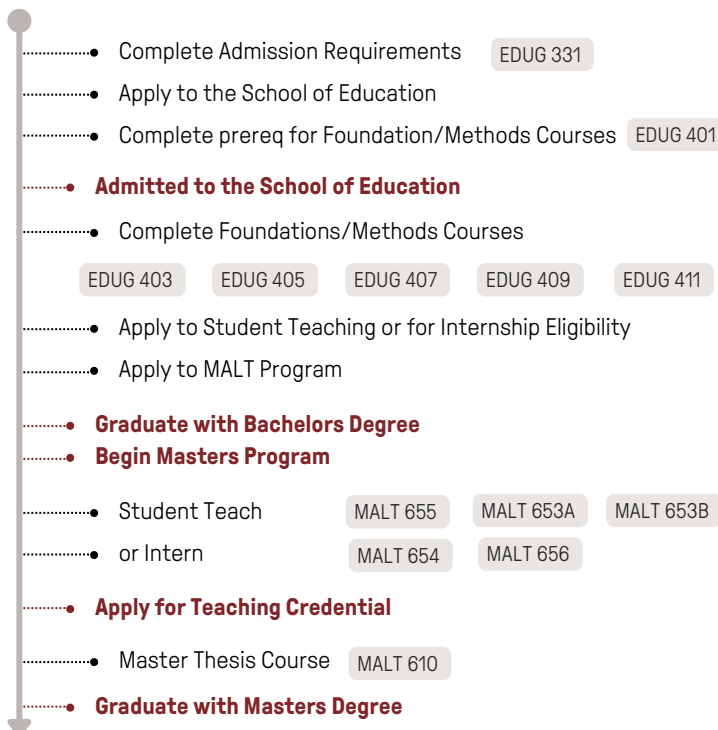
PRELIMINARY CREDENTIAL REQUIREMENTS

- [Subject Matter Competency](#): Must be met by the designated student teaching application deadline. It can be met through examination, academic degree, coursework, or a combo of coursework & examination.
- [US Constitution Requirement](#): Can be met by taking POLI 111: Intro to American Politics or HIST 121: American History to 1877.
- [CPR Certificate](#): Must be completed to apply for student teaching.
- [RICA Exam](#): Must be met for Preliminary Credential recommendation. Recommend to complete after meeting subject matter competency.
- [CalTPA Cycle 1 and 2](#): Must be met for Preliminary Credential recommendation. Will be completed during student teaching or internship.

EARN A MASTER'S DEGREE + TEACHING CREDENTIAL

Undergraduate students at the University of Redlands can complete up to 18 credit hours of degree work toward a Master of Arts in Education, Learning and Teaching (MALT) as undergraduates. This pathway to a profession in education helps to create a professional path to being a teacher for those undergraduates who have identified education as their passion early in their college experience.
