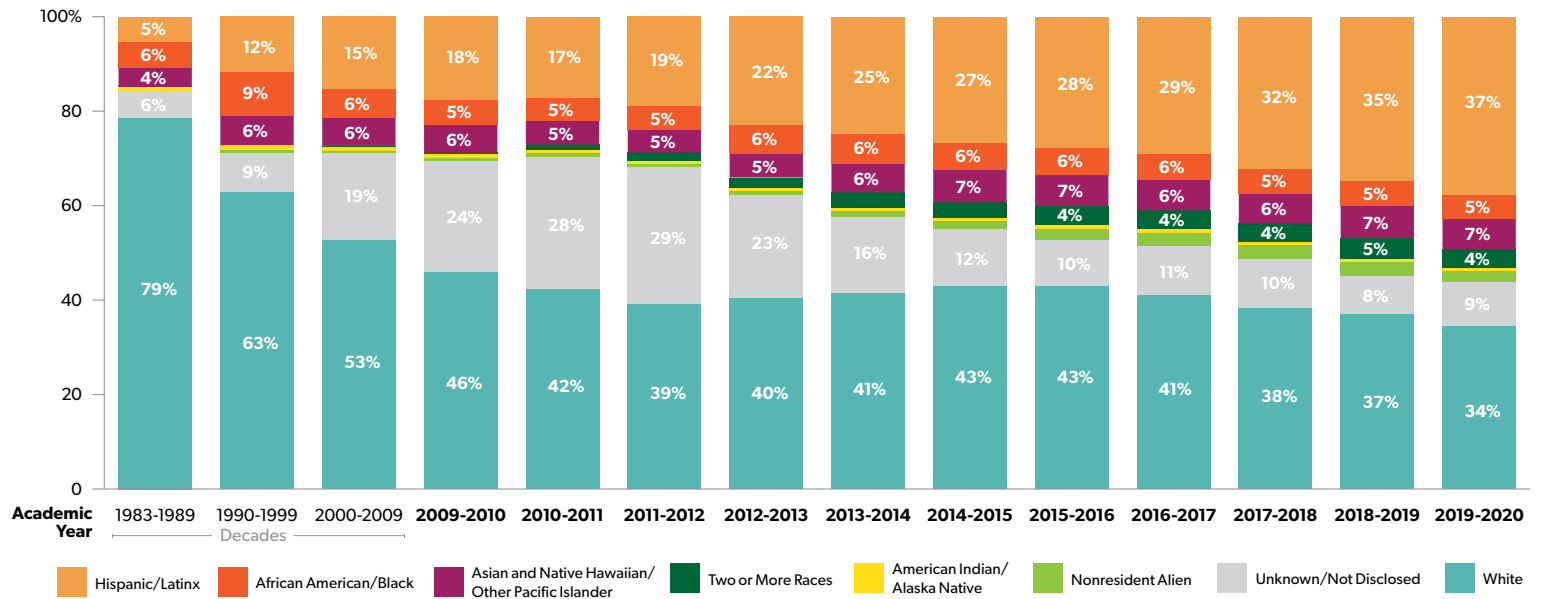


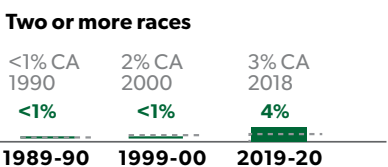
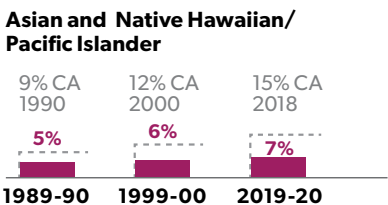
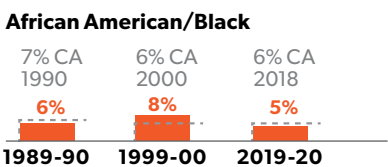
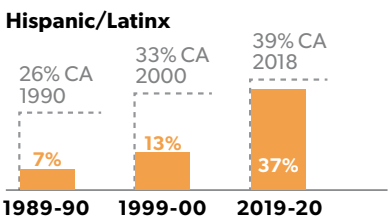
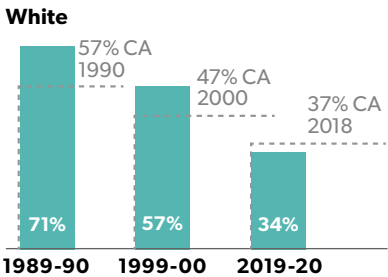
U of R Student Enrollment

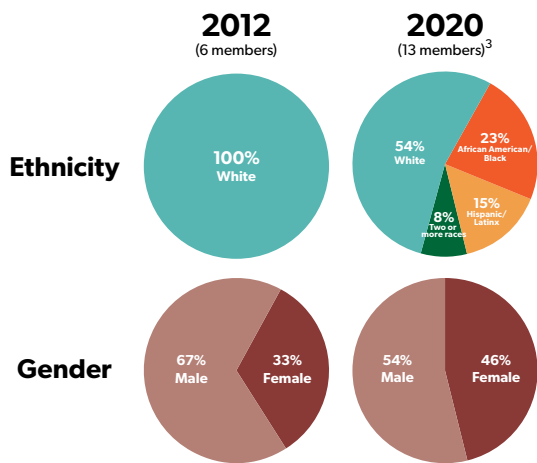


U of R Student Body vs California's Population

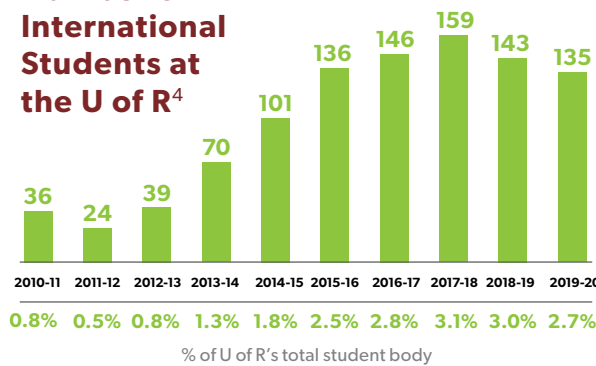
The composition of U of R's student body (represented below by solid bars) has changed to more closely reflect the diversity of the state² (represented below with grey dotted lines).



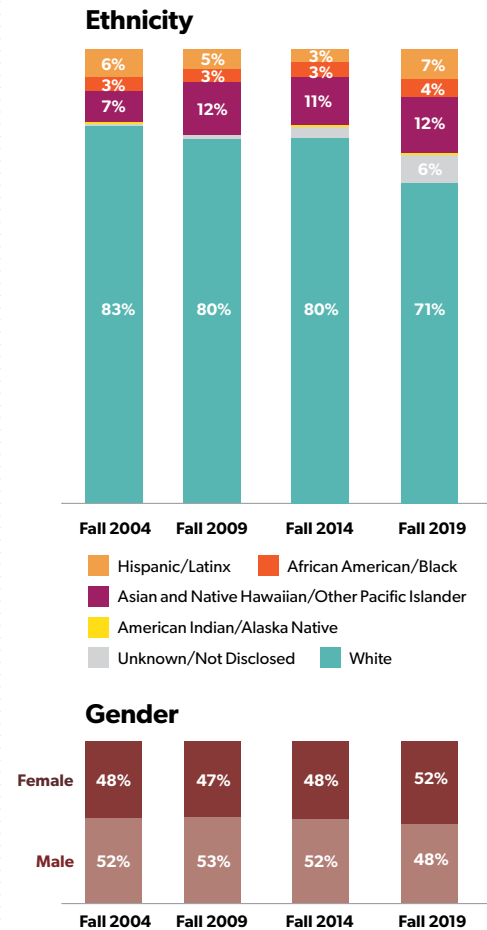

Number of International Students at the U of R⁴

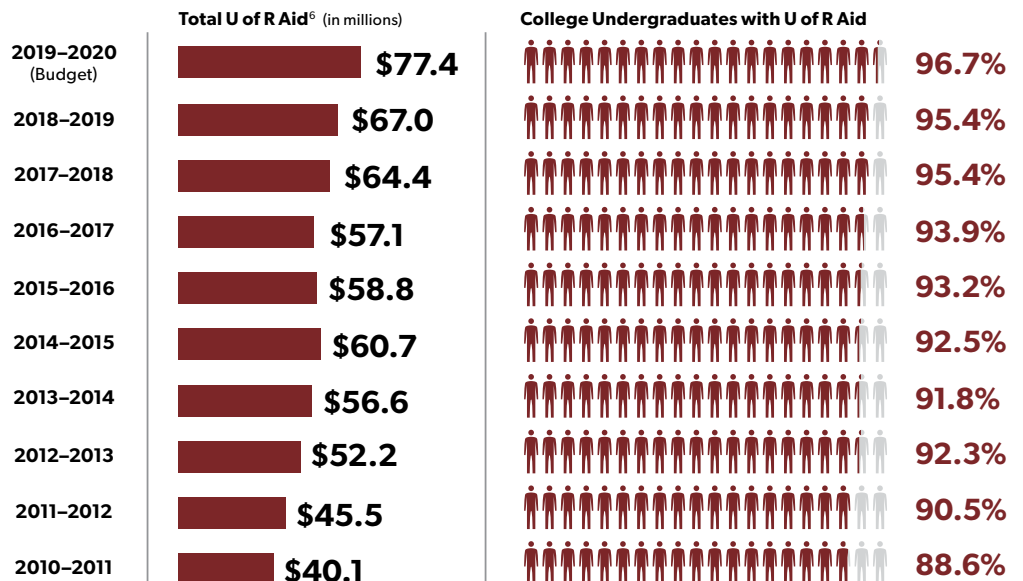


U of R Full-Time Faculty⁵
