WHAT IS IEESJ?

What is the Inland Empire Educators for Social Justice (IEESJ) network? IEESJ is a network of educators from across the IE who have come together to do anti-racist work. We support anti-oppressive, democratic education and seek to engage educators of all kinds to co-create intellectually rigorous curricula based on an ethic of care.

WHAT TYPE OF WORK WE DO

IEESJ members come together to form Inquiry-to-Action-Groups (ItAGs) to explore issues related to education and justice.

What's an ItAG?

An Inquiry-to-Action-Group, or ItAG, is a study group that comes together around a social justice issue or topic. ItAGs are usually small groups of educators, parents, students, activists, teaching artists, and community members. The goal of the ItAG is to pursue a common inquiry on a social justice topic and create an action around this area of study. The group decides the focus and structure of the meetings.

To provide educators with a safe space (a network) to have much needed conversations about race and racism in their schools. Through reflexivity and critical analysis, educators will work towards building their capacity (i.e., tools) to both disrupt and challenge ideologies that perpetuate race and racism in their schools. This safe space will allow:

- 1. Educators to critically examine their beliefs, opinions and attitudes towards race and racism
- 2. Educators to critically examine the role, the purpose and the function of schools (specifically for Black children)
- 3. Educators to be "re-educated" in ways that are culturally humane and inclusive of Black children
