## PRELIMINARY TEACHING CREDENTIAL, SINGLE SUBJECT UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

### UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Students from the College of Arts and Sciences interested in earning a teaching credential must apply to the School of Education. Undergraduate students can enroll in Child Development (EDUG 331) and Educational Foundations (EDUG 401) before the School of Education admission process. Students need to contact an enrollment counselor to discuss the best credential program pathway.

### SCHOOL OF EDUCATION ADMISSON REQUIREMENTS

- Completed application. [Learn more about applying to the School of Education.](#)
- Cumulative GPA of 2.75 or higher
- Evidence of negative TB test result within the last 2 years or chest x-ray exam within the last 5 years.
- Evidence of Certificate of Clearance
- Meet basic skills requirement
- Evidence of subject matter competency. Completion of waiver program or passage of CSET (Equivalency is determined by CTC). May show evidence of registration for the exam for application purposes, but will need to pass exam before student teaching.
- Evidence of 50 hours of observation or work with children, preferably in a public school setting or equivalent
- Completion of Child Development (EDUG 331)
- Two recommendations from professionals who know the applicant's capacity for academic work
- Admission decisions are made by the Departmental Admissions Committee

### STUDENT TEACHING REQUIREMENTS

Before advancing to student-teaching, students are required to complete the following:

- Cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above in teacher-prep courses.
- Students must clear all holds.
- Evidence of negative TB test result within the last 2 years or chest x-ray exam within the last 5 years.
- Evidence of adult, child, and infant CPR-AED certification.
- Evidence of subject matter competency.
- Complete a **Student Teaching Application** on or before the designated deadline.

### ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR CREDENTIALS

To be eligible to be recommended for the Preliminary Teaching Credential, candidates must meet the U.S. Constitution requirement. **Introduction to American Politics (POLI 111)** or **American History to 1877 (HIST 121)**, in the College of Arts and Sciences, or their equivalents, satisfy the requirement.

## PATHWAY

These pathways outline the recommended order for CAS students to complete the coursework to earn a teaching credential. With proper planning, it is possible to complete all coursework at the undergraduate level. Students will work in collaboration with their CAS faculty advisor and Office of Student Success advisor to customize an academic plan. If students are unable to complete all course work at the undergraduate level, they can continue coursework after earning their bachelor's degree in the Preliminary Teaching Credential or Master of Education, Teaching and Learning (MALT) program. Pathways provided by the School of Education are suggested schedules. Also shown are Group Advising presentations provided by the Office Student Success. Some sessions are required, others are optional.

## ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

### Culminating Fieldwork Experience

Upon successful completion of the required coursework and program requirements, students advance to student teaching. Students may complete an internship if they complete their bachelor's degree and continue as a credential student or Master of Arts in Teaching and Learning (MALT) student.

The regulations and requirements of our teacher education program are approved by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC). All teacher credentials candidates must demonstrate competency in their specific subject-matter area prior to student teaching/internship and the teaching seminar. [Learn more](#)

### Master of Arts in Education, Learning and Teaching

Undergraduate students at the University of Redlands can complete up to 18 credit hours of degree work toward a teaching credential or Master of Arts in Education, Learning and Teaching as undergraduates. Students who wish to pursue a master's degree must apply to the School of Education. The culminating fieldwork experience, student teaching/internship, must be completed at the graduate level.

This pathway to a profession in education helps to create a professional path to being a teacher for those undergraduates who have identified education as their passion early in their college experience.

Student teaching must be completed at the graduate level for students seeking a master's degree.
